The Reverend Dr. Frederick A. Davie '78

D.H.L. (Hon.) '24

Senior Strategic Advisor to the President, Union Theological Seminary, New York, NY

The Rev. Dr. Frederick Davie is a 1978 graduate of Greensboro College, where he received the Harold H. Hutson Award, graduated on the Dean's List, and served as the President of the Student Government Association, the first African American to be elected to this position. Rev. Davie is also a graduate of Yale Divinity School with a Master of Divinity degree. At Yale he was a Benjamin Elijah Mays Fellow of The Fund for Theological Education and President of Yale Black Seminarians.

He has had a long professional career in New York City in executive non-profit management, philanthropy and politics. For more than a decade he was Executive Vice President of Union Theological Seminary, where he now holds the position of Senior

Strategic Advisor to the President. He's also served as President and CEO of Public/Private Ventures, program director at the Ford Foundation, Deputy Borough President of Manhattan, Chief of Staff to a Deputy Mayor and Deputy Executive Director of the New York City Mission Society. He is an ordained minister in the Presbyterian Church USA, a Senior Fellow at Interfaith America, and on the board of the Interfaith Center of New York.

Rev. Davie advises at the intersection of faith, ethics and public policy. He serves as Vice Chair of the United States Commission on International Religious Freedom, a bi-partisan federal advisory agency focused on foreign policy and religious freedom abroad. He is Chairman of the New York State Commission on Ethics and Lobbying in Government, appointed by Governor Kathy Hochul. He was appointed by President Barack Obama to the White House Council on Faith-Based and Neighborhood Partnerships; gave a keynote address at a White House conference at the invitation of President George W. Bush. He was appointed Chairman of the civilian police oversight board (Civilian Complaint Review Board) in New York City and served as a Commissioner on the NYC Racial Justice Commission. Rev. Davie has traveled extensively in personal and professional capacities, including representing the United States government for consultations in Nigeria, Vietnam and Saudi Arabia. He currently serves on the Greensboro College Board of Trustees.

Rev. Davie grew up in Belmont, North Carolina and lives in New York City (Long Island, Queens), with his spouse of 26 years Michael Adams, a lawyer and CEO of SAGE.

THE LONG GREEN LINE

Dean's Award for Most Outstanding

Graduating Student in Business

Greensboro College has a longtime tradition of graduates lining the walkway to applaud their faculty members as they process into the commencement ceremony. Conversely, faculty will line the walkway to applaud their graduates as they recess with their diplomas. Over the decades, this practice has been lovingly named, *The Long Green Line*.

THE MACE



During the Middle Ages, the wood mace clad in metal was an effective weapon in battle, but as newer and more powerful military arms developed, it was transformed into a symbol of authority. The earliest ceremonial maces were borne by bodyguards of the 12th century English and French kings; by the end of the 16th century, they were used widely

by officials of English cities and towns. Today the ceremonial mace is found in the British Houses of Parliament, carried before ecclesiastical dignitaries and used in university and college convocations. The present Greensboro College staff of the mace, which is borne by the Faculty Marshal at academic convocation processionals and recessionals, was commissioned in 1982 by Dr. James S. Barrett, 15th president of the College (1981-1984), and carved by Benbow Furniture Company of Greensboro. It was designed to allow the addition of commemorative plates to the staff. The sterling plate affixed to the staff was a gift of the senior class of 1987. During the 2003-2004 academic year, Prof. Bob K. Kowski, Jefferson-Pilot Professor of Art Emeritus, redesigned the mace and gave it its distinctive look.

THE MEDALLION

Used since antiquity as symbols of momentous events as well as affiliations with groups and associations, medallions



were important in medieval times as symbols of membership in religious orders and guilds. As part of academic regalia, they may be struck for both ceremonial and commemorative uses. Greensboro College's silver-plated medallion, worn by the president during academic convocations, was first worn by 12th president Dr. J. Ralph Jolly (1964-1969) for his inauguration on October 28, 1965. Engraved with the College Seal, the medallion was created by Schiffman's Jewelers of Greensboro. For the Sesquicentennial celebration in 1988, the College commissioned Schiffman's Jewelers to design sterling silver links to be added to

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commemorate the presidents of the College. Each link of the chain bears the name of a Greensboro College president with the date of his or her tenure.
